

HARRISONBURG.

I was in Harrisonburg on June 29th, but the Treasurer did not have her report made up or her vouchers in shape to be checked at that time. There was an interval of only a few days between the close of the regular session and the opening of the Summer School, and as she has no assistance in the office and also has to attend to the supply room. I can well understand that it was almost impossible for her to make up her monthly statement at a time when some 500 Summer School students were entering the school. Miss Sprinkel will be relieved of the duties in connection with the supply room after September 1st. This work has interrupted her constantly during the past year. She reports that all old bills have been collected, with the exception of two amounting to \$171.50, and they will be paid in a short time.

The Harrisonburg School has employed a system of warrants drawn by the President on the Treasurer. With the beginning of the fiscal year, July 1st, 1915, checks on the banks made by the Treasurer and countersigned by the President will be employed as is now done by the other schools.

I find that the State Board of Education pays the teachers for the first term of the Summer School, but does not pay them for the second term. For the second term the teachers' salaries are paid in part by a registration fee of \$1.50 per pupil, and the balance from the Summer School receipts. The Harrisonburg, ^{and} Radford Summer Schools have two terms of Summer work, while the Fredericksburg and Farmville schools have one term only.

I will return in July to Harrisonburg and check up the accounts at the end of the fiscal year.
