

HARRISONBURG.

On August 9, I was at Harrisonburg and went through some of the buildings but did not check over any accounts. The Treasurer's statements agreed with the books of the School, and all expenditures were supported by proper voucher.

I have been to Harrisonburg several times during the summer, on work not connected with the Normal Schools but have taken occasion to notice the work being done on the service building. There have been few men at work and the work has advanced very slowly. This has been due largely to the inability of the contractor to get sand and gravel. At the present rate it is hard to foresee when the work will be completed. A considerable amount of grading has been done on the campus, under the direction of Mr. Chappellear who is in charge of the Agricultural work. Mr. Chappellear tells me that this work has been done to a large extent with the school team and that the labor regularly employed, and the total costs in addition to this will not amount to more than \$275.00. The attendance at the Summer School was considerably below that of last year, there being about 360 for the first term and 115 for the second term. The prospects for a full attendance for the regular session are good.
