HARR ISONBURG.

I was at Harrisonburg on June 20th and checked over the April accounts and found the Treasurer's statement to agree in all respects with the books of the school, and all expenditures supported by wouchers in proper form and amount. The Treasurer's statement showed a balance on hand May 1st amounting to \$10,133.90, of which \$8783.03 was to the credit of the Building Fund, \$190.94 to the credit of the Loan Fund, and \$1159.93 to the credit of the General Fund.

Liabilities as of May 1st. were reported as follows:

Deducting the balance on hand to the credit of the general fund 1,159.93
Leaves a balance of liabilities amounting to 4,565.41

I am glad to mention this because it shows that in spite of the high cost of all provisions the unpaid bills have been very materiall materially reduced during the spring, and judging from the meals I have taken at the school, this has not been done at the expense of the fare,

The Treasurer reported that she had collected all accounts due from students for the last session with the exception of one account, amounting to \$15.00.

The Summer School had commenced when I was in Harrisonburg, and so I could not make the same kind of examination of the rooms as at the other schools, but I think very few repairs will be necessary in the dormitories and that all of the walls and floors will be found in the same excellent condition as heretofore.

Mr.Bucher has completed the work of grinding the concrete porch floor at the new dormitory, and has done the work well. The floor locks much better than I had any idea it ever could.

Mr.Burruss bought his coal early at \$3.00 a ton, and is having it stored at the school as rapidly as possible.

The Summer School attendance is between 650 and 700, of which number 378 are being fed in the school dining room.
