State Normal and Industrial School for Women, at Harrisenburg, Varginia.

Gentlemen:-

I have the honor to submit the following report for the past year, including a financial statement as required by Article XII of the By-Laws of the Board, and a budget in accordance with Art. X of said By-Laws.

In view of the report made under date of September 15, 1908, and inasmuch as the Board has been called into session frequently during the past year, and consequently is familiar with the steps that have been taken, it will be possible to make this report brief.

During the past year the chief matters that have engaged my attention have been the planning and construction of buildings, the outlining of courses of instruction and the selection of instructors, the publication of literature and advertising the school. In prosecuting this work I have travelled over six thousand miles and have attended numerous meetings of teachers in various sections of the State, making one or more addresses at each meeting, have sent out from my office about 4,500 letters and have distributed about 16,000 circulars and bulletins of information.

Our buildings are now well under way and the contractors promise that they will be completed in time for the opening of the school, September 28th next. I believe that we have every reason to be satisfied with our building plans and with the work of the architect and contractors to date.

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Sur courses of study and plans of work have attracted considerable attention not only in Virginia but also elsewhere, and have received considerable commendation. As experience teaches us we shall probably find it advisable to make some changes from time to time, but it is confidently believed that the needs as far as they can be anticipated are well met. Our standards have been placed higher than those of the other normal school for women in this state; and, while this may act against us to some extent at first, it will undoubtedly scon result to our advantage. As soon as the high school authorities in the state realize that we are doing everything possible to help them and to keep from encroaching on their field of work, as the other normal school is doing, they will give us their hearty support. Some have already recognized our plans in this way.

In the selection of instructors I believe that the Board has acted wisely, time alone can prove how wisely. We have in our faculty men and women of high reputation both as to character and as to scholastic preparation and experience in teaching. It has not been possible to find sufficient funds to employ instructors in all the departments for which we would like to provide, and in some cases it has been necessary to provide temporary heads of departments, who will have to be superseded by higher-salaried instructors as soon as the required funds are available.

The school is being pretty thoroughly a dvertised throughout the state, especially the counties of the western half of the state. Considerable response has come from various sections, mostly requests for information, although a good number of applications for admission have already been filed. The present outlook may be considered

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good, and I think that there is no doubt that our boarding accommo-Cations will be taxed to the utmost. There is as yet no data at hand on which to base an estimate of the number of day students that may be expected, but it can hardly be hoped that the humber of such students will be large, as the community is not a large one, and the local high school is an unusually good one, providing four years of instruction. A large number of requests have come from prospective students for remunerative employment while at the school in order to defray the whole, or a partoof, their living expenses. It will be utterly impossible to provide employment for all of such such applicants, although practically all seem to be very worthy cases. The number of positions that may be filled by students will increase as the enrollment increases, but for the first session it will be quite small, It is gratifying to notest the large proportion of the applicants who have already filed papers, who are graduates of firstclass high schools or teachers of some experience, and who are applying for admission to the professional course or advanced classes in the regular normal course. It is also gratifying to note that a number have applied for the special course in Manual arts.

I take particular pleasure in reporting to you that arrangements are practically completed for using the public schools
of the town for observation and practice week teaching by the Normal
School Students. The public schools of the town embrace eight primary and grammar grades and four years of high school work. Arrangements are now under way to add a kindergarten to the system, thus
making it as complete as any public school system top be found anywhere.

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The pupils in these schools number about 700. The schools are in excellent condition, are wisely managed, and have competent teachers. The value to the Mormal School of thus securing a complete plant for its training work is very great; but the value of being thus enabled to offer its students a facilities mfor observation and practice teaching under real public school conditions cannot be overestimated. In this way there will be no specially selected classes of pupils and no artificial environment of any sort, as prevails in practically all normal schools. The teacher-in-training will meet the same conditions that she will face when she takes up her work after graduation. A training school is absolutely essential to the success of a Normal School, as it is the laboratory and workshop of the students who are learning to teach. No Normal School in my agquaintance has had a finer opportunity in this direction, or one at so little cost. We should do everything in our power to further this arrangement.

EQUIPMENT -- DORMITORY AND ANNEX.

Contracts and orders, as per list summitted herewith, \$4,782.21 As most of the items shown in the above statement have been discussed and passed upon by the Board in previous meetings, it will be unnecessary to call further attention to them at this time. The following items being increased over former amounts approved by the Board, require explanation.

The Board appropriated \$1,500 for water connections, sewers and general improvement to grounds. It was afterwards ordered that \$2000.00 be allowed for water connection and sewers, but no further provision was made for general improvements to grounds, such as clearing up, grading, laying walks, etc. \$2,500 instead of \$2,000 is asked for this purpose.

Since the electrical work was contracted for it has been found that separate feed lines will have to be run for the power required by our motors, hence an additional appropriation of \$200 is asked for this purpose, which amount will probably cover the few additional electrical work items which will probably have to be provided for.

The item of \$1,000 for "extras to general contract, etc." is necessary in view of the additional work on foundation to Dormitory building, and a few extra items in the plumbing, etc., to which could not be anticipated before the contracts were awarded.

The Board appropriated \$4,000 for the equipment of the Science Hall building. It is now found that a close estimate makes it necessary to provide \$709.02 additional for this purpose, making a total of \$4,709.02 for the equipment for this building.

The Board appropriated \$3,500 for the equipment of the Dormitory building. It has been found that this amount is hardly enough to cover the equipment in this building, and an additional amount would probably be necessary in any case. Since the number of boarders will

probably be considerably larger than the rooms of the Dormitory building will accommodate, it was thought best to use the residence, which was bought with the grounds, as an annex to the dormitory, thus increasing the boarding capacity of the school from 50 to 70, or 40%. It will be a difficult matter to make the boarding department of the school self-sustaining the first year, on account of the comparatively small number of boarders for the necessary equipment, force, etc., which must be provided, hence it is very desirable to accommodate as many boarders as possible, since the greater the number the less will be the cost. The Board has provided for the number of improvements necessary to put the house in condition to be used for this purpose, and the additional equipment has been ordered. To cover the cost of the furniture and equipment of the Dormitory and Dormitory Annex, the additional sum of \$1282.21 is necessary, making a total of \$4,782.21 for this purpose.

It will be noted that this budget for maintenance calls of for \$5,000 more than the appropriation of \$15,000 made to the Board for maintenance the first year. It is not possible to conduct the school on the lines thus far laid down for its work on so small an appropriation as \$15,000. The above budget is prepared in the belief that the maintenance appropriation for the following year will be considerably increased, and inasmuch as the said appropriation will be available in the early spring of 1910, one-fourth of the above amount could be paid out of the new appropriation, leaving only \$15,000 to be provided for out of the appropriation already made.

Appended to this report are the bills and detailed statements of equipment referred to in the above financial statement.

In closing this report of my first year's work, I wish to sincerely thank the members of the Board of Trustees for their kind consideration, faithful assistance and support, without which it would have been impossible to have accomplished what has been done during the year.
